Police: Missing faculty member found

on Oct. 11 has been found, according to the UTRGV Police Department. The department's Criminal Investigations Division received a phone call on Oct. 11 informing them a faculty member was missing. "[The call] came in through out to the dean and the provost," said UTRGV Assistant Chief of Police Van Slusser. "We were then informed of the situation from there."

According to University Police, the faculty member's disappearance had already been reported to the Weslaco Police Department. An investigation was opened, and it was being treated as a missing person's case. The missing faculty member was later found, according to Slusser. UTRGV Police Department is not releasing the name of the faculty member at this time.

The Rider filed public information requests with the UTRGV Police Department and Weslaco Police Department Oct. 18 to obtain copies of the police report. The Rider will provide an update when the reports are released.

Among others gathered under a darkening Texas sky Oct. 14 was UTRGV business junior Constantine Poulos, his Nikon DSLR camera, a 200-millimeter lens and a tripod.

Poulos traveled to Corpus Christi with his family to view his first annular solar eclipse, during which the sun, moon and Earth align, casting a shadow on the planet and hushing the birds.

Over the span of three hours, the astrophotographer took individual exposures of different stages of the eclipse and compiled them into a mosaic using Adobe Photoshop.

During the event, the moon is "far enough" from the Earth so that it "doesn't take up all of the sun, so it's not a total eclipse," Poulus told The Rider last Thursday.

"You still see a ring of the sun, which is why it's called the 'Ring of Fire," Poulos said. " ... It's a rather rare event. It happens, I think, every few years in different parts of the world, but one happening in Texas is very rare."

While a total solar eclipse covers the sun completely, See **ECLIPSE**, Page 3



Travel suspended amid Israel-Hamas war Ali Halloum

THE RIDER The University of Texas System, in a recently issued memorandum, has suspended all university-related travel to Israel, the Gaza Strip and the West Bank until further notice. This is due to an escalating conflict and humanitarian crisis in the region.

In the same memorandum, the UT System also considered

suspending travel to Jordan and Lebanon, with special approval being required for any university travel to those countries.

The decision was made after careful consideration by the UT System and by the International Oversight Committee, a UT Systemaffiliated department that oversees international travel made on behalf of UTRGV.

Edith Galy, an associate professor of international business and entrepreneurship and chair of the IOC, explained the committee's decision to suspend travel to Israel, Gaza See **TRAVEL**, Page 8

Early voting starts today

Early voting for the Nov. 7 election on 14 proposed Texas constitutional amendments, including a retirement age increase for judges and the Centennial Parks Conservation Fund, starts today and continues through Nov. 3.

The UTRGV Student Academic Center on the Edinburg campus is one of the 29 early voting locations in Hidalgo County.

The Cameron County Judicial Complex, located at 954 E. Harrison St. in Brownsville, is one of the 16 polling locations in the county.

UTRGV experts explained what some of the proposed constitutional amendments mean and their importance.


Mark Kaswan, a political science professor, said Proposition 1 would establish a right for people who own a ranch. "People who own in rural areas, who own ranch land, basically, farmers, ranchers, people who are on land for the purpose of wildlife management, things like that," Kaswan said. "Which is kind of funny, like, why do we have to establish a right for that. And the explanation that's given is that Texas is growing. And the cities in Texas are growing."

He said a concern raised by Proposition 1 is that it "would actually empower large-scale industrial farming and it might make it more difficult to enact regulations that are meant to protect small family farms."

Andrew Smith, a political science assistant professor and pre-law adviser, said Proposition 2 would benefit working parents.

"Proposition 2 allows local governments to exempt child-care facilities from property taxes," Smith said. "The logic behind this is that it will make it easier for one, new child-

Edinburg City Council ECISD superintendent explains tax ratification election

The Edinburg Consolidated Independent School District has presented to the Edinburg City Council a proposal for a Voter Approved Tax Ratification to enhance educational resources.

"We have an item on the Nov. 7 election and we wanted to give you a briefing on what that item entails," ECISD Superintendent Mario Salinas said during the public comment section of last Tuesday's council meeting.

According to the ECISD website, if voters approve the tax ratification: --property taxes will decrease for ECISD taxpayers in the 2023-2024 school year --the Voter-Approval Tax Ratification Election will allow the ECISD to keep 3 cents of the reduced property taxes

--the proposed 3 cents will total \$6.7 million in annual funding to the district (\$3.22 million in local taxes and \$3.49 million in state aid).

Salinas presented statistics to councilmembers, making his case why the tax ratification should pass.

"We have 4,700 full-time employees, our budget is over \$400 million a year, we have the highest-paid teachers in the [Rio Grande] Valley, and we have over 34,000 students attending our schools,' he said.

Adel Felix, ECISD assistant superintendent for Finance & Operations, provided information to councilmembers regarding the VATRE.

"Edinburg CISD property tax rate will be decreasing by 21.71 cents," Felix said. "And we are asking for three of those pennies through a voter approval tax ratification election."

Currently, the tax rate for ECISD is \$1.06 for every \$100 valuation. And

resulting in even darker skies, an annular eclipse is when the moon only takes up 90% of the sun, according to Juan Madrid, an assistant professor in the Department of Physics and Astronomy at UTRGV.

Poulos said he became interested in astrophotography after taking Madrid's Introduction to Astronomy I class.

Madrid said viewing a solar eclipse with the naked eye can cause blindness and recommends using special solar eclipse glasses.

"The issue is that your eyes are going to act as that magnifying glass and you're going to end up burning your eyes or your retinas if you look

the proposed tax rate is 0.8750 cents, including the effects of the VATRE, a decrease of .1854 cents, according to Felix.

"Three pennies will generate approximately \$6.7 million to ECISD, 3.3% of that would come through tax collection and 3.5% from sustained school funding," she said.

The funds would be allocated toward enhancing security on ECISD campuses and for employee compensation, according to Felix.

The proposed tax ratification will also continue to provide student laptops and iPads for instructional needs, according to the school district's website. Felix told councilmembers and

residents they could access more information about the tax ratification on the ECISD website.

During the public comment section of the meeting, residents of Shalom Drive voiced their continuing concern over a lack of drainage in their community.

"I pay close to \$6,000 in taxes every year," said resident Joe Guerra.

"Just a friendly reminder that we're there and we need that sewer line," Guerra said. "... Having a bag of toilet tissues next to your toilet ... that's, like, a health issue. But we need to do that because the septic tanks clog, and they charge a pretty penny to unclog it."

In a presentation on public utility infrastructure that followed public

'All Texas judges must retire at the age of 75," Smith said. "This constitutional amendment would raise that age to 79. It would also raise the minimum retirement age from 70 to 75.

He said if the passed, proposition would af incumbent Republican judges. affect

"Raising the retirement age will make it easier for Republicans to maintain an absolute control over all branches of the Texas judiciary since many of the judges that would be affected by this change are incumbent

Republicans," Smith said. Proposition 14 would allow the creation of the Centennial Parks Conservation Fund to be used for the creation and improvement of state parks.

Kaswan said it would provide a steady revenue stream for the State Parks and Wildlife program.

"One of the things is that it creates what's called a trust fund," he said. "I mean, that's basically it. So, people have noted that Texas has a lower acreage of parks than most other states. ... So, you know, as the population grows, more people want to use the parks, and parks need more money to operate. So, this creates a dedicated fund to support that." Several cities and school districts will also conduct elections for board of trustees and municipal posts and bond issues, including Edinburg, where two councilmember seats are up for election. Incumbent Johnny Garcia is being challenged by David Salazar for the Place 3 position. Gerardo "Gerry" Lozano is challenging incumbent David White for the Place 4 seat.

comment, Tomas D. Reyna, assistant city manager, told councilmembers, "We are proposing an 8-inch sewer line to connect all the way to Alberta Road and to extend services to the [Shalom] residents."

"Right now, for the sewer line, the manhole and the paving, we're looking at a total of \$358,000, and we have already begun the procurement process," Reyna said.

Mayor Ramiro Garza Jr. asked Reyna how long it would take before residents at Shalom Drive would have access to the sewer line.

"I would say it will be a seven-to-eightmonth process," Reyna replied.

Shalom Drive residents will be contacted by the City of Edinburg once the project is completed, after which residents will be required to hire a plumber to connect them to the sewer line, according to Reyna.

"We'd like to let our community know that we do hear you," Place 1 City Councilmember Daniel "Dan" Diaz told the residents. "This has been something we've been working on, [but] it's hard to give false hope till we figure it out, so all the time you've come here and spoken to this group, we've heard you".

In other city news, Assistant Director of Cultural Arts Magdiel Castle announced the department's achievement of receiving seven Pinnacle awards at the International Festival and Events Association: gold for best single digital ad and bronze for best promotional poster, both for the Frida Fest; silver for best overall entertainment program and bronze for the best T-shirt design, both for the Los Muertos Bailan; gold for best promotional poster and T-shirt design and silver for best printed material multiple page, all for the South Texas International Film Festival.

So, this was like an appetizer for us.

Poulos encourages people to view a solar eclipse at least once.

"It's a beautiful experience," he said. "Everyone should experience it."

Madrid said the April solar eclipse will take place in the middle of the day and result in total darkness. He explained that a few centuries ago, before the ability to predict solar eclipses, "people would completely panic.'

However, he said there were civilizations that could "predict eclipses with great accuracy," including the Mayans, who knew how to predict eclipses centuries in advance.

Though there is an aura of fear currently present as the movie inches closer and closer, the production team continues to reassure fans.





La votación temprana para las elecciones del 7 de noviembre sobre enmiendas constitucionales 14 propuestas en Texas, incluido un aumento de la edad de jubilación para los jueces y el Fondo de Conservación de Parques Centenarios, comienza hoy y continúa hasta el 3 de noviembre.

Académico para El Centro Estudiantes de UTRGV en el campus de Edinburg es uno de los 29 lugares de votación anticipada en el condado de Hidalgo.

El Complejo Judicial del Condado de Cameron, ubicado en 954 E. Harrison St. en Brownsville, es uno de los 16 lugares de votación del condado.

Expertos de UTRGV explicaron qué significan algunas de las enmiendas constitucionales propuestas y su importancia.

Mark Kaswan, profesor de ciencias políticas, dijo que la Propuesta 1 establecería un derecho para las

personas propietarias de un rancho. "Las personas que poseen tierras en áreas rurales, que poseen tierras de rancho, básicamente, agricultores, ganaderos, personas que están en tierras con el fin de gestionar la vida silvestre, cosas así", dijo Kaswan. "Lo cual es un poco gracioso, por qué tenemos que establecer un derecho para eso. Y la explicación que se da es que Texas está creciendo. Y las ciudades de Texas están creciendo".

Dijo que una preocupación planteada por la Proposición 1 es que "en realidad potenciaría la agricultura industrial a gran escala y podría dificultar la promulgación de regulaciones destinadas a proteger las pequeñas granjas familiares".

Andrew Smith, profesor asistente de ciencias políticas y asesor universitario en derecho, dijo que la Propuesta 2 beneficiaría a los padres que trabajan.

"La Propuesta 2 permite a los gobiernos locales eximir a las guarderías de los impuestos a la propiedad", dijo Smitĥ. "La lógica detrás de esto es que, por un lado, será más fácil que surjan nuevas guarderías

y, por otro, tal vez se reduzca de el costo inscribir a los niños en estas instalaciones, lo que ayuda mucho a los padres que trabajan".

La Proposición 10 autorizaría a la Legislatura de Texas a eximir de impuestos ad valorem el equipo o el inventario en poder de un fabricante de productos médicos o biomédicos. de su tesorero del condado", dijo Kaswan. "Dicen que las cosas que están cumpliendo, ya sabes, están repartidas entre diferentes cargos. Supongo que en ese condado tuvieron una votación y la gente del condado de Galveston dijo que querían deshacerse del cargo".

Kaswan dijo que proporcionaría un flujo constante de ingresos para el programa de Parques Estatales y Vida Silvestre.



Play comes to the stage in time for spooky season

"It watches,' he added suddenly. 'The house. It watches every move you make."

This quote, from Shirley Jackson's 1959 book "The Haunting of Hill House," embodies the feeling the UTRGV Theatre Department hopes to bring to the stage during its production of the paranormal story.

Reputation precedes Hill House for countless tragedies and its haunted nature.

"Silence lay steadily against the wood and stone of Hill House, and whatever walked there, walked alone," the book reads.

The story follows a paranormal researcher who is trying to conduct an investigation into the supernatural occurrences of the house, all while one character begins to be influenced by the house, which ends with tragic results.

The mental state of the main character, Eleanor Vance, who is invited to Hill House by Dr. John Montague, the paranormal researcher, deteriorates throughout the plot and it becomes increasingly unclear to the audience whether the haunting is caused by external forces or Vance's own psychological distress.

Brian Warren, director of the production and a professor in the Department of Theatre, said in the slow-burning plot, the tension builds until the spine-chilling

climax. "We see through Eleanor, she's the main character, we see through her eyes what she is

seeing," Warren said. He said young people who are unsure of the path they are taking might be able to relate to the main

character. "This entity grabs hold of that [vulnerability]," Warren said. "The entity inside the house, which we're, kind of, not sure what that is."

The cast includes Ashley Cantu as Eleanor Vance, Thomas Pearson as Dr. Montague, Emily Lopez as Mrs. Dudley, Chelsea Martinez as Theodora, Scot Johnson as Luke Sanderson, Gina Rodriguez as Mrs. Montague, Justin Vasquez as Arthur Parker, Amparo Villanueva as Crain

it gets tensed up," Salazar said. The lighting director said the story

is one person's journey into madness. "She just, kind of, succumbs into

herself, and her own thoughts and her own mind," he said.

Jennifer Saxton, costume designer and an associate professor in the Department of Theatre said the play is a bit different from the novel and Mike Flanagan's Netflix show by the same name.

and the West Bank.

"We follow the UT System guidance," Galy said. "We get reports every single day of what is happening. We also get reports from On Call [International], which is our travel insurance service.

"There's war. That is a grave, grave concern. So, if there's a war, of course, there's going to be a travel ban. UT System is very concerned with everybody's health. They're very conservative. So not only the country ... where war outbreaks or breaks out, [but] also all of the neighboring countries may be included in [the ban]."

There was already significant tension, which was exacerbated when groups of Israeli settlers accompanied by Israeli police officers stormed the Al-Aqsa Mosque in occupied East Jerusalem.

Nicholas Kiersey, a political science professor at UTRGV, explained why the storming of the Al-Aqsa Mosque was a significant factor in the buildup to the crisis.

"[The storming of the mosque] was really seen as an egregious affront to the dignity of the Palestinian people," Kiersey said. "It seems very clear that the events are connected—the storming of the Al-Aqsa Mosque and the subsequent decision by Hamas to launch a very significant attack on Israel."

Hamas is a Palestinian Islamic political party that has an armed wing of the same name, according to the Associated Press. Kiersey elaborated further.

"Palestinian people do


not have a lot of political institutions, especially in Gaza, that they can turn to, to represent them because Israel will not allow them to have elections," he said. "Hamas is an institution that does exist. It is a paramilitary organization as well as a theocratic ideological group. Hamas is by no means a perfect angel. In this conflict, it's obviously like many other paramilitaries in these situations where a very small minority group with no power are fighting for autonomy and independence are often left forced to do awful things in order to get the world's attention to their struggle and plight."

On Oct. 7, the armed wing of Hamas launched an attack on southern Israel, which killed 1,403 Israelis, injured 4,629 and resulted in 203 people being taken hostage by the group, according to the Israeli army.

In response, Israel immediately ordered a complete isolation of the Gaza Strip, cutting off all access to food, water, fuel, electricity and the internet.

They also immediately began a relentless bombing campaign, dropping 6,000 bombs on Gaza in a six-day span, more than it dropped during its 50-day invasion of the Gaza Strip in 2014.

This conflict has exacerbated an already dire humanitarian situation in the Gaza Strip. Almost 2 million people reside in the Gaza Strip, all in an area smaller than the city of Brownsville. Over 95% of its population has no access to clean water, and its population relies almost entirely on foreign aid for basic services.

The death toll in Gaza has been extensive. As of Oct. 19, over 3,785 Palestinians have been killed in the days since Oct. 7, including 1,524 children, and 12,493 have been injured, according to the Gaza Health Ministry.

Hospitals, schools, residential buildings and United Nations facilities have not been spared, with hundreds of civilians killed last Tuesday in an attack on the Al-Ahli Arabi Baptist Hospital in Gaza City. Generators across the Gaza Strip are running out of fuel due to the blockade. These generators, typically found in hospitals and aid centers, are among the last places in the Gaza Strip with working electricity since Israel cut the power.

There are concerns that this conflict will spill over into neighboring countries, particularly Lebanon, where Israel and Lebanese militia Hezbollah have been increasingly exchanging

rocket fire.

UTRGV is concerned about developments along Israel's borders with Lebanon and Jordan, and the IOC elevated the status of the two countries, with special approval from the university now required for travel to Lebanon and Jordan.

The Rider asked Kiersey about the potential for regional spillover.

"My understanding is that Israeli Air Force has already started attacking Hezbollah targets in Lebanon," he said. "They just, they've been doing that for several days, but they announced it formally [last Tuesday] morning. And this, I think, is a preemptive strike because Iran has warned in no uncertain terms that major attacks on the Gaza Strip will solicit a reaction from Iran. The United States has two carrier battle groups en route. And, probably, these are the major reasons, right now, why this war is not escalating into a full-blown regional conflict. We're in a very dangerous and precarious situation right now. The whole region could be sucked into a conflict."
